Quick Installation Guide

11g Release 2 (11.2) for Microsoft Windows (32-Bit)

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This guide describes how to quickly install the Oracle Database product on 32-bit Windows systems. It includes information about the following:

This guide describes how to install Oracle Database using the default installation options into a new Oracle home.

Tasks Described in this Guide

The procedures in this guide describe how to:

- Configure your system to support Oracle Database.
- Install Oracle Database software on a local file system by using the Typical installation method.
- Configure a general-purpose Oracle database that uses the local file system for database file storage.

Results of a Successful Installation

After you successfully install Oracle Database:

- The database that you created and the default Oracle Net listener process run on the system.
- Oracle Enterprise Manager Database Control is running and can be accessed using a Web browser.

Tasks Not Described in this Guide

This guide covers the Typical Installation scenario and does *not* describe how to complete the following tasks:

- Using the Advanced Installation option to install the software.
- Installing the software on a system that has an existing Oracle software installation.
- Installing Oracle Clusterware and Oracle Real Application Clusters.
- Cloning an Oracle home.
- Enabling Enterprise Manager e-mail notifications or automated backups.
- Installing and configuring Oracle grid infrastructure.

2 Log On to the System with Administrator Privileges

Log on as a member of the Administrators group to the computer on which you want to install Oracle components. If you are installing on a Primary Domain Controller (PDC) or a Backup Domain Controller (BDC), log on as a member of the Domain Administrators group.

3 Check the Hardware Requirements

The following hardware components are required for installing Oracle Database:

Table 1 Hardware Requirements

Requirement	Minimum Value
Physical memory (RAM)	1 GB minimum
Virtual memory	Double the amount of RAM
Disk space	Total: 5.15 GB See Table 2 for details.
Processor Type	Intel-compatible processor
Video adapter	256 colors

3.1 Hard Disk Space Requirements

[Table 2](#) lists the space requirements on NTFS. Oracle strongly recommends that you install the Oracle database home (Oracle database binaries, trace files, etc.) on Oracle ACFS or NTFS; the database files themselves must be placed on Oracle ASM if using

Oracle ACFS; otherwise they can be placed on NTFS. Usage of Oracle ACFS and Oracle ASM or NTFS instead of FAT32 is recommended to ensure security of these files. The starter database requires 1.55 GB of disk space. The figures in this table include the starter database. FAT32 space requirements are slightly higher.

Table 2 Disk Space Requirements on NTFS

* Refers to the contents of the `admin`, `cfgtoollogs`, `flash_recovery_area`, and `oradata` directories in the `ORACLE_BASE` directory.

** This size can be higher depending on the installation options selected, such as languages or additional components. If you choose to install Oracle Database with automated backups enabled, include at least 2 GB extra for data file disk space.

To ensure that the system meets these requirements, follow these steps:

1. Determine the physical RAM size. For example, on a Windows Server 2003 computer, double-click **System** in the Windows Control Panel and click the **General** tab.

On a Windows Server 2008 R2 computer, click **System and Security** in the Windows Control Panel, then click **System**.

If the size of the physical RAM installed in the system is less than the required size, then you must install more memory before continuing.

2. Determine the size of the configured virtual memory (also known as paging file size). For example, on a Windows 2003 computer, double-click **System**, click the **Advanced** tab, and click **Settings** in the Performance section. Then click the **Advanced** tab.

On a Windows Server 2008 R2 computer, click **System and Security**, then click **System**, click **Advanced System Settings**, click the **Advanced** tab on System Properties page, and then click **Settings** in the Performance section. Then select the **Advanced** tab on Performance Options page.

The virtual memory is listed in the Virtual Memory section.

If necessary, see your operating system documentation for information about how to configure additional virtual memory.

3. Determine the amount of free disk space on the system. For example, on a Windows 2003 computer, double-click **My Computer**, right-click the drive where the Oracle software is to be installed, and select **Properties**.

On a Windows Server 2008 R2 computer, right-click **My Computer** and click **Open**.

4. Determine the amount of disk space available in the `temp` directory. This is equivalent to the total amount of free disk space, minus what is needed for the Oracle software to be installed.

On Windows 32-bit, if there is less than 500 MB of disk space available in the `temp` directory, then delete all unnecessary files. If the temp disk space is still less than 500 MB, then set the `TEMP` or `TMP` environment variable to point to a different hard drive location.

For example, to change the environment variables on a Windows Server 2003 computer, double-click **System**, click the **Advanced** tab, and click **Environment Variables**.

On a Windows Server 2008 R2 computer, click **System and Security**, then click **System**, click **Advanced System Settings**, click the **Advanced** tab on System Properties page, and then click **Environment Variables**.

4 Check the Software Requirements

Table 3 lists the software requirements for Oracle Database.

6 Install the Oracle Database Software

To install the Oracle Database software:

Note: If you run Oracle Universal Installer when the Windows Scheduler jobs are running, then you may encounter unexplained installation problems if your Windows Scheduler job is performing cleanup, and temporary files are deleted before the installation is finished. Oracle recommends that you complete installation before the Windows Scheduler jobs are run, or disable Windows Scheduler jobs that perform cleanup of temporary files until after the installation is completed.

1. If you are installing Oracle Database on a multihomed computer or a computer that uses multiple aliases, use the **System** in the Control Panel to create the `ORACLE_HOSTNAME` system environment variable. Set this variable to point to the host name of the computer on which you are installing Oracle Database.
2. Insert Oracle Database installation media and navigate to the `database\Disk1` directory. Alternatively, navigate to the directory where you downloaded or copied the installation files.

Use the same installation media to install Oracle Database on all supported Windows platforms.

3. Double-click `setup.exe` to start Oracle Universal Installer.
4. Follow these guidelines to complete the installation:
 - Do not install Oracle Database 11g Release 2 (11.2) software into an existing Oracle home.
 - Follow the instructions displayed in the Oracle Universal Installer screens. If you need additional information, click **Help**.
 - When prompted for a password, follow these guidelines:

The installation does not continue if the following requirements are not met.

- Password cannot exceed 30 characters.
- Password cannot contain invalid characters: `! @ % ^ & * () + = \ | ` ~ [{] } ; : ' " , < > ?`
- A user name cannot be a password.

- An empty password cannot be accepted.
- The SYS account password cannot be change_on_install. (case-insensitive)
- The SYSTEM account password cannot be manager. (case-insensitive)
- The SYSMAN account password cannot be sysman. (case-insensitive)
- The DBSNMP account password cannot be dbsnmp. (case-insensitive)
- If you choose to use the same password for all the accounts, then that password cannot be change_on_install, manager, sysman, or dbsnmp. (case-insensitive)

Note: You must remember the passwords that you specify.

- Do not modify the Java Runtime Environment (JRE) except by using a patch provided by Oracle Support Services. Oracle Universal Installer automatically installs the Oracle-supplied version of the JRE. This version is required to run Oracle Universal Installer and several Oracle assistants.
- If you encounter errors while installing or linking the software, see Appendix F in *Oracle Database Installation Guide for Microsoft Windows* for information about troubleshooting.
- If you chose an installation type that runs Database Configuration Assistant and Oracle Net Configuration Assistant in interactive mode, you must provide detailed information about configuring your database and network.

If you need assistance when using the Database Configuration Assistant or Oracle Net Configuration Assistant in interactive mode, click **Help** on any screen.

Note: If you chose a default installation, Database Configuration Assistant and Oracle Net Configuration Assistant run non-interactively.

5. When the configuration tools finish, click **Exit**, then click **Yes** to exit from Oracle Universal Installer.
6. When Oracle Enterprise Manager Database Control opens in a Web browser, enter the user name and password you created during the installation.

You can log in as SYS, SYSTEM, or SYSMAN. If you log in as SYS, then you must connect AS SYSDBA. Enter the password you specified for the account during installation.

7. Optionally, delete the OraInstalldate_time directory to remove the temporary files that were created during the installation process. The OraInstalldate_time directory holds about 45 MB of files. This directory is created in the location set by the TEMP environment variable setting.

Restarting your computer also removes the OraInstalldate_time directory.

8. See Chapter 5 in *Oracle Database Installation Guide for Microsoft Windows* for information about postinstallation tasks that you must complete after you have installed Oracle Database.

Screen	Recommended Action
Configure Security Updates	<p>Enter your e-mail address, preferably your My Oracle Support (formerly Oracle<i>MetaLink</i>) e-mail address or user name in the Email field.</p> <p>You can select the I wish to receive security updates via My Oracle Support check box to receive security updates.</p> <p>Enter your My Oracle Support (formerly Oracle<i>MetaLink</i>) password in the My Oracle Support Password field.</p> <p>Click Next.</p>
Select Installation Option	<p>Select Create and Configure a Database from the following list of available options, then click Next:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">■ Create and Configure a Database: This option creates a new database along with sample schemas.■ Install Database Software only: This option installs only the database binaries. To configure database, you must run Oracle Database Configuration Assistant after the software installation.■ Upgrade an existing database: This option installs the software binaries in a new Oracle home. At the end of the installation, you can upgrade the existing database.
System Class	<p>Select Server Class from the following options to install the database, and click Next.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">■ Desktop Class: Choose this option if you are installing on a laptop or desktop class system.■ Server Class: Choose this option if you are installing on a server class system, such as what you would use when deploying Oracle in a production data center.
Grid Installation Options	<p>Select Single instance database installation for the type of database installation you want to perform, and click Next.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">■ Single instance database installation: This option installs the database and the listener.■ Real Application Clusters database installation: This option installs Oracle Real Application Clusters and the listener.
Select Install Type	<p>Select Typical Installation as the installation type from the following options, and then click Next:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">■ Typical Installation: This installation method is selected by default. It lets you quickly install Oracle Database using minimal input.■ Advanced Installation: This installation method enables to perform more complex installations.

Screen	Recommended Action
Typical Install Configuration	<p>Enter the following information according to your requirements:</p> <p>Oracle base: The Oracle base path appears by default. You can change the path based on your requirement.</p> <p>Software location: In the Software Location section, accept the default values or enter the Oracle home name and directory path in which you want to install Oracle components. The directory path should not contain spaces.</p> <p>Storage Type: Select File System, or Automatic Storage Management as the database storage option.</p> <p>Database file location: If you select File System as your storage type, then click Browse and specify a database file location.</p> <p>ASMSNMP Password: If you select Automatic Storage Management as your Storage Type, then specify the password for the ASM-SNMP user.</p> <p>Database Edition: Select the database edition to install.</p> <p>Global database name: Specify the Global Database Name using the following syntax:</p> <p><i>database_name.domain</i></p> <p>For example, <i>sales.us.example.com</i></p> <p>Administrative password: Enter the password for the privileged database account.</p> <p>Confirm Password: Reenter, and confirm the password for the privileged database account.</p> <p>Click Next to continue.</p>
Perform Prerequisite Checks	<p>Verify that all the prerequisite checks succeed, and then click Next.</p> <p>Oracle Universal Installer checks the system to verify that it is configured correctly to run Oracle software. If you have completed all the preinstallation steps in this guide, all the checks should pass.</p> <p>If a check fails, then review the cause of the failure listed for that check on the screen. If possible, rectify the problem and rerun the check. Alternatively, if you are satisfied that your system meets the requirements, then you can select the check box for the failed check to manually verify the requirement.</p>
Summary	<p>Review the information displayed on this screen, and then click Finish.</p> <p>Note: Starting with Oracle Database 11g Release 2 (11.2), you can save all the installation steps into a response file by clicking Save Response File. Later, this file can be used for a silent installation.</p>
Install product	<p>This screen displays the progress of a database installation. It also shows the status information while the product is being installed. Click Next.</p> <p>This screen then displays the status information for the configuration assistants that configure the software and create a database. When the message is displayed after Database Configuration Assistant process, click OK to continue.</p>
Finish	<p>This screen is shown automatically when all the configuration tools are successful.</p> <p>Click Close.</p>

Log in with the user name SYSMAN. Use the password that you specified for this user during the Oracle Database installation.
